


Cecilia Canales, MD, MPH

Dr. Canales' research focus is patient-oriented outcomes research in aging surgical patients. She has developed and implemented a diagnostic accuracy study to identify if Point-of-Care ultrasound measurements can be used to discriminate between frail and not frail patients to predict postoperative outcomes. She is also focused on studying factors that contribute to postoperative neurocognitive disorders (PND). Dr. Canales is a National Institute of Aging-Butler-Williams Scholar, and is particularly interested in studying PND in minority elders. Limited English proficient patients are excluded from PND studies since language can influence neurocognitive tests. Dr. Canales's work aims to bridge this gap to better understand the needs and treatment strategies.

Steven Joseph Nieto, PhD is a project scientist in the Department of Psychology at UCLA. He received his PhD in Behavioral Neuroscience from the University of Houston in 2019. His work focuses on leveraging deep behavioral phenotyping and human laboratory paradigms to advance precision medicine for addiction, particularly alcohol use disorder. His research interests include: (1) identifying neurofunctional domains relevant for etiology and treatment of addiction, (2) applying behavioral economics to screen novel medications for alcohol use disorder, and (3) examining the relationship between chronic pain and heavy alcohol use.

She returned to UCLA for cardiothoracic surgery fellowship and joined the UCLA Division of Thoracic Surgery in 2018. Her research interests include identifying disparities in the receipt of curative cancer care among underserved communities and employing novel research methods that empower patients to participate in the development of interventions to improve their access to guideline concordant cancer care.

Dr. Siddiq's background is in inpatient psychiatry and community-based mental health care. She received her PhD at the University of California, Los Angeles School of Nursing, and completed a postdoctoral fellowship in health services and health policy research at the UCLA National Clinician Scholars Program. Her work focuses on the role of community-based mental health services in addressing the needs of immigrant and refugee populations and training future clinicians in trauma-informed tele-mental health care for marginalized patient populations. Her current research examines the role of social isolation and social cohesion on the physical and mental health of older adult refugees from Muslim-majority countries.
